COURSE PROCEDURE FOR

**Academic Reading Strategies
EBE2221 Credit Hours 1**

Student Level:

This course is open to students on the college level in either the freshman or sophomore year.

Catalog Description:

EBE 2221 - ACADEMIC READING STRATEGIES (1 hr)

A course designed to improve the student's skills for comprehending, applying, and evaluating text for academic purposes. Emphasis is placed on learning and applying strategies to increase the student's ability to comprehend and critically evaluate different types of academic texts enabling him or her to deal more effectively with college-level reading materials. The content of the course will cover those areas that develop reading competency at a post-secondary level. This course does not count toward an AS, AA, AAS, or AGS degree.

Prerequisites: This course is required for any student scoring between 63 and 80 on the Compass reading assessment or any student who has completed Academic Reading Expansion with a passing grade.

Controlling Purpose:

This course is designed to help students increase their knowledge concerning reading strategies employed by successful college students across the curriculum.

Learner Outcomes:

Upon completion of the course, the student will be able to identify academic text types and employ appropriate strategies to comprehend, apply, and evaluate text for academic purposes.

Units Outcomes and Criterion Based Evaluation Key for Core Content:

The following defines the minimum core content not including the final examination period. Instructors may add other content as time allows.

Evaluation Key:

- A = All major and minor goals have been achieved and the achievement level is considerably above the minimum required for doing more advanced work in the same field.
- B = All major goals have been achieved, but the student has failed to achieve some of the less important goals. However, the student has progressed to the point where the goals of work at the next level can be easily achieved.

- C = All major goals have been achieved, but many of the minor goals have not been achieved. In this grade range, the minimum level of proficiency represents a person who has achieved the major goals to the minimum amount of preparation necessary for taking more advanced work in the same field, but without any major handicap of inadequacy in his background.
- D = A few of the major goals have been achieved, but the student’s achievement is so limited that he is not well prepared to work at a more advanced level in the same field.
- F = Failing, will be computed in GPA and hours attempted.
- N = No instruction or training in this area.

UNIT 2: Applying Text Information

Outcomes: Students will successfully apply information in texts to complete academic tasks.

						Use information from non-fiction texts to discuss (verbally or in writing) the author's perspective on a topic or issue as well as the student's personal understanding of the issue.

UNIT 3: Evaluating Text

Outcomes: Students will successfully evaluate texts to complete academic tasks.

						Identify text purpose.
						After comprehending expository text structure and information, evaluate the types of supports and information provided to determine whether or not the text adequately meets its informational purpose and justify (verbally or in writing) why the text has or has not met its purpose.
						After comprehending fictional text, evaluate the key elements of the story to determine whether or not the text has adequately met its purpose and justify (verbally or in writing) why the text has or has not met its purpose.
						After comprehending non-fiction text argument structure, evaluate the argument and supporting details to determine whether or not the text adequately meets its purpose and justify (verbally or in writing) why the text has or has not met its purpose.

Projects Required:

Short story, essay, or article review

Course Timeframe:
